


The call to do is about you. So, too, is the call to be. Yet the call to witness fully involves you but is about others.


You following and helping others find Jesus is the adventure of a lifetime!



In our partnership with Practicing the Way, we invite you into a deeper Call To Witness through developing the spiritual practice of reading Scripture.

Should you choose to engage, what can you expect? Scripture has four session videos, weekly exercises and readings, and additional resources to help your LifeGroup create life-changing daily rhythms as you apprentice under Jesus. Transformation happens in community. Running the practice of scripture together looks like setting a time each week to gather with a LifeGroup to watch the session video and then discuss, reflect, and pray.

Using the Scripture Companion Guide, you'll practice it through the weekly reach exercises and have a chance to dive deeper through the assigned readings and podcast episodes. The following week, you'll reflect on how it went. Remember: the goal is growth, not perfection.

Own/Others HEARTSTRONG

To assist you in growing in Christ-like maturity, building upon examples from Christian history, we have curated a structure for you to utilize on your own and with others.

Daily you can use the STRONG system to spend time with God. In Groups, you can use the HEART questions to go deeper together.



STRONG (Own)

See...Your day with God's eyes, not merely your own. Thank...God for the forthcoming day: each day is a gift. Review...Your completed day with the Holy Spirit. Own...Your sin/shortcomings: Repent and Confess. Necessary...God's presence to be in your day. Invite Him. Give...Grace to yourself and others to be more like Jesus.

HEART (Others)

Honest: What known sins have I committed? Express: Where am I currently being tempted? Ask: God's grace to cover and truth to set you free. Realize: Where is God at work setting you free? Truth: Is there anywhere I have lied tonight?





Heartstrong Group OVERVIEW: BOOKS OF THE BIBLE

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Becoming Heartstrong Ezra/Nehemiah

Summary, Message, and Purpose

The books of Ezra and Nehemiah narrate the Israelites' return to the promised land from exile, framed around the rebuilding of the temple and the restoration of the walls of Jerusalem.

The books of Ezra and Nehemiah bear the names of the key person in each of the books. Until the 3rd century A.D., though, the books were regarded as a single book. Each contains material found in the other.

It is probably safe to assume that Ezra-Nehemiah were written soon after the conclusion of Nehemiah's ministry. Ezra continues where 2 Chronicles left off. While it provides us with key historical insights, it is rich in messages for God's people.

The events in these books connect the Israelites with the pre-exilic community. The returning exiles experienced a new exodus and remained a part of God's redemptive plan. God even used pagan leaders like Cyrus and Artaxerxes to restore His people.

Genre, Structure

Historical Narrative | The books use many sources in their composition. These include two major types of sources. Types of sources: Material from the Ezra Memoir and the Nehemiah Memoir. For a community attempting to reestablish itelf after the disaster of 586 B.C. and the subsequent exile to Babylon, this material was cruicial in reordering their life as a community.

Becoming Heartstrong **Esther** Summary, Message, and Purpose

In the book of Esther, God spares the Jewish people from potential annihilation through unlikely figures and events. The principal message of the book of Esther called all Jews to celebrate Purim. The purposes of Esther can be distinguished into two types: those purposes that pertain to the original audience of the book during the Persian period and the broader, theological purposes that transcend the book's original readers. It is unlikely the lack of any mention of God in the book is accidental. It leaves the reader to ponder the work of God, evident but unseen, in the unfolding story of deliverance and redemption.

This is fitting since Jews in exile would be tempted to find lack of evidence for God's overt presence to be evidence for his actual absence.

The book of Esther counters this notion, depicting God's providence as ruling even the events of foreign lands during the Jews' exile.

Historical Narrative | The book of Esther is written in a form of late biblical Hebrew common to the postexilic era and found in other Biblical books of that time, such as Chronicles-Nehemiah, and Daniel. Like Ezra-Nehemiah, Esther shows the growing influence of Aramaic in its grammar and vocabulary, as well as the presence of many Persian words.

Becoming Heartstrong Job

Summary, Message, and Purpose

The book of Job demonstrates that a sovereign, righteous God is sufficient and trustworthy for every situation in life, even in the most difficult of circumstances.

The book of Job teaches that suffering comes to everyone, the righteous and unrighteous alike. God does not always keep the righteous from danger or suffering. Ultimately God controls all of life's situations, including limiting the power of Satan. God's comfort and strength are always available to the trusting soul.

Although the book of Job does take note of the problem of suffering, it focuses more on the nature of human conduct before a sovereign and holy God.

Genre, Structure

Historical Narrative, Poetry, Wisdom | The writer was a skilled storyteller, artistically characterizing the distinctions between the protagonist (Job), antagonist (Satan), and literary foils (the three friends and Elihu). The characterization demonstrates that God himself is the ultimate protagonist (or "hero") of the story.

Becoming Heartstrong **Psaims** Summary, Message, and Purpose

The book of Psalms consists of many different hymns and prayers composed by individuals but used by the community. If one were to take the names in the titles as authors, the date of composition ranges from the time of Moses (fifteenth century BC) to a time following the exile (sixth century BC or later). Some of the titles do contain historical information that might indicate the setting of the composition, although even this (like the authorship) is ambiguous.

There are a myriad of messages scattered through the 150 psalms, but overall, this record of the responses of God's people in worship and prayer serves the purpose of teaching us how to relate to God in various circumstances of life. The psalms also demonstrate God's sovereignty and goodness for his people in order to instill confidence in those who trust in him.

Genre, Structure

Poetry, Wisdom Literature | The book of Psalms is, from first to last, a book of poetry. Hebrew poetry lacks rhyme and regular meter but uses parallelism wherein two (or three) lines are balanced and complete a thought. The psalms can be divided into classes. There are hymns (145-150) and songs of thanksgiving (30-32). Psalms of lament (38-39) are prayers or cries to God during distressful situations. Royal psalms (2; 110) are concerned with the earthly king of Israel. Enthronement psalms (96; 98) celebrate the kingship of the Lord. Penitential psalms (32; 38; 51) express contrition and repentance, and wisdom or didactic psalms (19; 119) tend to be proverbial.
