




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Gather Grow Go

Worship: The Call To Be

As followers of Jesus, our doing flows from our being. For the health of our souls, it is best not to reverse this order. Life will often pull you to reverse this order, but the power of the Holy Spirit, coupled with your spiritual disciplines, is essential to hold your heart in Jesus.

A simple analogy to hold, which we learned from Terry Walling, is as follows; Think of yourself as a railcar running along two tracks. Track A is called Being; this is our inner life: the track where God is at work in you, creating your inner Christ-like character. It is the place where Jesus is actively forming you. It is a contested space with plenty of other influences that seek to begin or keep you deformed or formed to another other than Christ.

Track B is called Doing: This is where we serve using our spiritual gifts, acquired skills, knowledge, and natural abilities. This is what others see us doing (or not doing). In the track where God works through you, evident by how you serve and minister to other, the temptation is to live exclusively from this track. For a railcar to run effectively, it requires contact on both tracks to reach its desired destination. At the end of our lives, we each wish to hear Jesus say, "Well done, good and faithful servant," this is our desired destination.

To run well requires both being and doing.



This season, in our partnership with Practicing the Way, we invite you into a deeper Call to Be through developing the spiritual practice of Community.

Should you choose to engage, what can you expect? <u>Community</u> has four session videos, weekly exercises and readings, and additional resources to help your LifeGroup create life-changing daily rhythms as you apprentice under Jesus. Transformation happens in community. Running the practice of Community together looks like setting a time each week to gather with a LifeGroup and share a meal, watch the session video, and then discuss, reflect, and pray.

Start small. Using the Community Companion Guide, you'll practice Community through the weekly exercises and have a chance to dive deeper through the assigned readings and podcast episodes. The following week, you'll reflect on how it went. The goal is growth, not perfection.



Way

Each season, we select a specific Spiritual Practice. Season Seven is Community, and over the course of this season we would encourage you to challenge yourself to engage community.

Own/Others HEARTSTRONG

STRONG (Own)



See...Your day with God's eyes, not merely your own.
Thank...God for the forthcoming day: each day is a gift.
Review...Your completed day with the Holy Spirit.
Own...Your sin/shortcomings: Repent and Confess.
Necessary...God's presence to be in your day. Invite Him.
Give...Grace to yourself and others to be more like Jesus.

HEART (Others)



Honest: What known sins have I committed?

Express: Where am I currently being tempted?

Ask: God's grace to cover and truth to set you free.

Realize: Where is God at work setting you free?

Truth: Is there anywhere I have lied tonight?







Proverbs

Summary, Message, and Purpose

A proverb is derived from astute observations about how life usually works; the creator of a proverb shows himself very knowledgeable and perceptive, able to see what is generally true and to draw conclusions from it: "The pen is mightier than the sword." In addition to all this, the proverbs in the book of Proverbs are also divinely inspired. Since they come from God, we know they are true and we can be certain they are beneficial.

Because these proverbs are in the Bible, they do not just entertain; they exhort, encourage, and offer hope. Solomon called readers, especially youth, to pursue wisdom rather than foolishness. He encouraged the inexperienced to become wise rather than mockers, to be teachable rather than incorrigible, to live rather than to die. He predicted that people who pursued wisdom would generally find success and happiness in this life, but he promised that they would absolutely find joy and blessing in eternity.

Author

Solomon is credited with the proverbs in chapters 1-29. The last two chapters are credited to Agur and Lemuel (30:1; 31:1), about whom nothing else is known.

Genre, Structure

The book of Proverbs is in the wisdom genre. Wisdom books consist of the intelligent author's observations on the world and the people in it. However, without an inspired, godly perspective, the world would be depressing and hopeless, as parts of Job and Ecclesiastes show. Ultimately, biblical wisdom is informed by and founded on faith in God.



Ecclesiastes

Summary, Message, and Purpose

The book of Ecclesiastes faces the issue of how we can find meaning in life in light of the seemingly futile nature of everything. It will not allow the reader to retreat into superficial answers. It does not answer this problem by comforting us with hollow slogans. To the contrary, its motto is "Everything is futile." But by forcing us to face the futility of human existence, it guides us to a life free of empty purpose and deceitful vindication.

Ecclesiastes shows us that since we and our works are futile-that is, destined to perish —we must not waste our lives trying to justify our existence with pursuits that ultimately mean nothing. Put simply, Ecclesiastes examines major endeavors of life in light of the reality of death.

Genre, Structure

Ecclesiastes does not have the kind of structure we usually look for in a book of the Bible. At first glance it seems to move to and fro among various topics in a way that seems almost incoherent. It has no simple hierarchical outline, and it often jumps rapidly from one topic to the next. But a closer look reveals a structure that alternates between two perspectives: that of human existence apart from God and that of existence lived before God.



Song of Songs

Summary, Message, and Purpose

The Song of Songs celebrates the love of Solomon and his bride, who is called Shulamith or the Shulammite (6:13). The excitement of courtship, the beauty of the wedding night, the sexuality of the first night and subsequent nights, as well as tender friendship-all of these elements make this book a celebration of romance and marital sensuality as God intended them

The central theme of the Song of Songs is a celebration of the goodness and beauty of romantic love. The Song's romantic ideals are as captivating as its imagery: emotional intimacy, sensitive communication, delightful sexuality, profound companionship, common perspective, willing forgiveness, respect, integrity, security, love's devotion through bleak seasons of winter, and love's renewal in new seasons of spring.

Genre, Structure

The Song of Songs is a poem whose components form a chiastic structure. The author intended to emphasize the central elements of the structure, the day and night of the wedding. When God inspired Solomon to write this song, he gave divine approval to romantic love.



Isaiah

Summary, Message, and Purpose

The book of Isaiah is powerful in its poetic imagination, intriguing in its prophetic vision, and complex in its structure. One can never read or study the book without gaining new insights into the nature of God and our relationship with him. The authors of the New Testament read the book of Isaiah in light of the coming of Christ and realized that this prophet anticipated the Messiah's coming with remarkable clarity. For this reason they quoted or alluded to Isaiah more than any other Old Testament book.

Isaiah's message is relatively simple. First, Isaiah accused God's people of sin: rebelling against the one who made them and redeemed them. Second, Isaiah instructed these sinners to reform their ways and act obediently. Third, Isaiah announced God's judgment on the people because of their sin. Finally, God revealed his future restoration of the people, or at least of the faithful remnant who survived the judgment. As part of the restoration of God's people, Isaiah foresaw both judgment on the nations (chaps. 13-23) and a future turning of the nations to God (2:1-4). The first part of the book (chaps. 1-39) emphasizes sin, the call to repentance, and judgment; the second part (chaps. 40-66) emphasizes the hope of restoration.


Author

Isaiah

Genre, Structure

The book of Isaiah is a combination of both prose and poetry. The prose is found primarily in chapters 36-39, a section that forms a bridge between the two sections of the book. Isaiah's poetry is rich and varied. He wrote hymns, wisdom poetry, and even poetry that resembles a love song (5:1-7). The richness is seen in Isaiah's vocabulary. He used over 2,200 different Hebrew words, far more variety than is found in any other Old Testament book.
